Sign-ups will be first-come, first-serve; sign-ups open July 19 at 9:30 am (CT).



ONE-YEAR ANNIVERSARY

March 8th marked our one-year anniversary at the New Monastery! We observed the occasion as as day of prayer, offering our thanks to God and asking Divine blessings on all who had a hand in bringing this monastery into being. We look back on the past year with humble gratitude, and look ahead with hope for a long future for our Cistercian community here at the New Monastery.

ALTAR, AMBO, AND TABERNACLE INSTALLATION

With much excitement, the crates arrived from Italy bearing the new altar, ambo, and tabernacle. The crates were filled with pieces of marble that had to be assembled like giant puzzle pieces. These new sanctuary furnishings were installed at the end of March. The Oratory is now one step closer to being complete with the beautiful new altar, ambo, and tabernacle in place.

Now that we have a permanent altar, we are able to dedicate the oratory to be an edifice *For the Glory of God*. The dedication is scheduled for August 24th. In this newsletter we will explain the reasons why the Church dedicates buildings and consecrates altars, explaining the significance of each part of this solemn rite.

SOLAR ARRAY INSTALLATION

Included in the New Monastery project's original scope, the solar array was among the many fatalities of budget cuts. Happily, with your generous support, we were able to add it back this year and the installation is underway. One hundred and twelve modules form the 61.6 kW (DC) / 53.7 kW (AC), tiltable, ground-mounted array. We are incorporating five batteries to prolong the availability of solar power and will tie them into our emergency power system so that we can maintain essential functions long past what our small generator would support. We are grateful this addition will increase the sustainability of the New Monastery - helping to conserve natural resources, reduce our energy costs, and increase our energy independence. Many thanks to Solar Legacy for their consultative guidance, All Sky Energy for the installation, and ETI for their engineering support. WHY DEDICATE A CHURCH?

The Rite of Dedication of a Church is one of the Church's most solemn liturgical acts and follows an ancient custom. It is the means of consecrating a church exclusively to God, making it a fitting place of prayer, praise, the celebration of the sacraments, and the reservation of the Eucharist. The church building is a visible sign of the Church, that is, the People of God who are the Temple of God made of living stones, a spiritual house built upon Christ, the cornerstone (see 1 Peter 2:4-6). Central to this rite is the consecration of the altar, which stands as a sign of Christ, who is the priest, the victim, and the altar of His own sacrifice.

This solemn Rite of Dedication is remembered with joy annually on the anniversary of the church's consecration to God, observed as a solemnity.

A dedication is particularly significant for a monastic community, as the Oratory forms the heart of the monastery where we gather seven times a day to pray the Divine Office, daily to celebrate the Sacrifice of the Mass, and throughout the day to seek Our Lord's Eucharistic Presence. The rite also recalls each nun's consecration to God when she became a bride of Christ, enfleshing the bridal identity of the entire Church, a living temple of God's presence in the world. We also see it as deepening our roots here at the New Monastery now that we will have a permanent Oratory, as well as giving expression to our life of stability in this place where our lives are hidden with Christ in God.

BLESSING & SPRINKLING OF WATER

After the entrance procession, the bishop blesses holy water. He then processes through the church, sprinkling the people and the walls and finally the altar. This rite is a sign of re-creation in the water flowing from the side of Christ. The materials taken from the earth to create this sacred space are cleansed through the paschal mystery. This cleansing is a preparation for

the consecration with oil. The people too are a temple of God; throughout the Dedication ceremony blessings over the altar and building are repeated on the people to convey this reality. As St. Bernard encourages, "Those things that have visibly taken place within these walls should therefore be fulfilled in us spiritually."

PLACEMENT OF RELICS

Following the Liturgy of the Word, the Litany of the Saints is chanted, invoking the prayers of all the Saints. Then the relics of martyrs are solemnly deposited and sealed into the altar. Our altar design did not allow us to deposit the relics during the Dedication Mass; rather we had a separate ceremony to solemnly deposit the relics when the altar was installed.

From ancient times the Church has built altars over the tombs of martyrs and placed relics of martyrs into altars, recalling the vision in the Book of Revelation.

Let these triumphant victims be brought to the place where Christ is the victim. But He upon the altar, who suffered for all; they beneath the altar, who were redeemed by His Passion. Let us, then, deposit the sacred relics, and lay them up in a worthy resting-place.

PRAVER OF DEDICATION

Now surrounded by the choirs of Angels and in the company of all the Saints, the bishop invokes God's blessing on the church and the altar through a lengthy Prayer of Dedication. Here are a few excerpts:



This house brings to light the mystery of the Church,
Which Christ made holy by the shedding of his blood,
So that he might present her to himself as a glorious Bride,
A Virgin resplendent with the integrity of faith.
A Mother made fruitful by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Blessed is the Church,
God's dwelling-place with the human race,
A holy temple built of living stones,
Standing upon the foundation of the Apostles
With Christ Jesus its chief cornerstone.

Here may the flood of divine grace Overwhelm human offenses, So that your children, Father, being dead to sin, May be reborn to heavenly life.

Here may the joyful offering of praise resound, With human voices joined to the song of Angels, And unceasing prayer rise up to you For the salvation of the world.

Here may the poor find mercy,
The oppressed attain true freedom,
And all people be clothed with the dignity of your children,
Until they come exultant to the Jerusalem which is above.

ANOINTING THE ALTAR & WALLS

After the solemn Prayer of Dedication, the bishop pours holy Chrism on the altar. By anointing the altar with Chrism the altar is made a symbol of Christ, who is the Anointed One, the true High Priest, and the one who on the altar of the cross offered the sacrifice of His life for our salvation. After the bishop anoints the altar, twelve anointings are made on the walls of the church, in accordance with ancient tradition and recalling the Apostolic foundations of the Church. This anointing sanctifies the space, signifying the church is entirely and perpetually given over to Christian worship. Each of the anointing locations are marked on the walls with a tile and adorned with a candle. We are using marble tiles made by the same artisan who crafted our altar and engraved with the cross design that is used on our altar bread, adding significance to the already rich symbolism.

INCENSATION OF ALTAR & CHURCH

Following the anointing with Chrism, a brazier is filled with incense and placed upon the altar. The incense offering signifies that the Sacrifice of Christ, which is perpetuated in mystery upon that altar, ascends to God as a pleasing fragrance. The incense is also a sign of the pleasing and acceptable prayers of the faithful that rise up to the throne of God (see Rev 8:3-4).

After the altar is incensed, ministers are sent throughout the body of the Church to incense the congregation and the walls, dedicating both the people and the walls to God and forming both into a house of prayer. The People of God are living stones and temples of the Holy Spirit. The very air of the space is made holy, lifting up the entire cosmos and consecrating it to God.

I urge you, brothers and sisters, in view of God's mercy, to offer your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God - this is your true and proper worship.

LIGHTING OF ALTAR & CHURCH

The altar is then fittingly prepared and adorned for the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The nuns will dress the altar and prepare it for the Lord's Supper. They will be united with the Blessed Mother who lovingly dressed the Christ-Child and placed the shroud on His broken body.

Then, like the Easter Vigil, the altar and the Church are lit, reminding us that Christ is the light of the world, a light for revelation to the Gentiles, of whose brightness shines out in the Church. The altar candles are lit, followed by the candles marking the Chrism locations, and the space that was only dimly lit up to now is brought into full brightness. The candles represent the Risen Christ, the Church as a vigilant Bride waiting for His return in glory, and the grace in the souls of the baptized.

THE EUCHARISTIC SACRIFICE

It is the presence of Christ that truly consecrates the altar. The celebration of the Eucharist upon the newly anointed altar is the principal part of the whole rite. This Eucharistic Sacrifice is the foremost end for which the church was built and the altar erected. Furthermore, the reception of the Holy Eucharist sanctifies the hearts of those who receive it. Thus, it is fitting that this first Eucharistic Sacrifice on the new altar be the height of the celebration of the dedication of the Oratory.

The altar is an object of wonder: by nature it is stone, but it is made boly after it receives the Body of Christ.
